Lady Kingsmill Nature Reserve

With the generosity of donors Bob and Arlene Perly Rae, the Rideau Waterway Land Trust has established its 19th nature reserve. This 6 acre island is located in Big Rideau Lake in the area of Grindstone and Plum Islands. The island is covered in mature trees, both deciduous and coniferous, that have been virtually untouched by humans in almost 100 years. The shoreline is in its natural state. With the exception of a small marshy inlet, the lake bottom adjoining the island is a mixture of sand, clay and occasional cobble stone which provides spawning areas for many varieties of important fish specie found in the Big Rideau Lake.



The island was originally part of the Kingsmill Estate established in the early 1900's, until purchased by the Rae family just over a decade ago.




Sir Charles Kingmill was the first Director of the Royal Canadian Navy and he and Lady Kingsmill developed the estate on adjoining Grindstone Island as their summer residence. Sir Charles Kingsmill used this well known estate until his death in 1935. Lady Kingsmill continued the tradition of using Grindstone Island as a meeting place for family and friends until her death in 1956.

Bob and Arlene Perly Rae have made this generous donation to the RWLT and the Rideau community and have asked that it be known as the Lady Kingsmill Nature Reserve in recognition the Kingsmill family's significant contribution not only to the Rideau community but also to Canada.

The RWLT would like to thank the Rae's for this generous gift on behalf of the Trust and the community.

Sugarbush Island Walking Trail



As many of you will remember, with significant support from RWLT members and the community the RWLT purchased Sugarbush Island in 2010. This ecological gem is located in the east end of Lake Opinicon near Chaffey's Lock. Situated at the entrance to Murphy's Bay Wetland, the island and its shorelines provide habitat to many species at risk and is well documented as an important natural area in protecting the biodiversity of the Rideau community.

The island provides impressive vistas both over the acres of wetland as well as Lake Opinicon.

In 2011 the Trust worked with Mr. Bryan Gentry, our neighbour to the south, who has generously donated a permanent right of way from the short land bridge that connects the island and the mainland to the Davis Lock Road. This will allow the Trust to develop a parking area and walking trail to give the community an opportunity to enjoy the vistas this property has to offer.

Development of this trail will take place over the summer of 2012 with an open house planned for October 14th.


Trail route planning and design began in 2011. It required various approvals from authorities. The objectives of the trail are based on promoting healthy lifestyles in our community while enabling conservation education. A professional land-scape architect was retained and with input from Orland Con-

servation Services and our own volunteer ecologist, Simon Lunn, the drawings were completed. Special care was taken to identify all conservation values of the land and then design a trail that would not impact on these identified values while allowing the community to enjoy the vistas offered by this property.

To enable all members of the community to enjoy the trail it will be built 6' wide with low slopes. Crib stairs will be built in the three areas where the slope exceeds 8%. There will be viewing areas established with interpretive signage. Opportunities are available for donors who wish to sponsor benches in the resting areas. With trail plans in place approval was sought and obtained from the authorities.

The trail development costs have been estimated at \$85,000 and in early 2012 fundraising began. At the time of this newsletter 69% of the goal, or \$59,000, has been reached. Leading off the campaign was The Ontario Trillium Foundation who have given the Trust a grant of \$40,900. Supporters from the community have started to get behind the project. The volunteers from the Trust will be contacting our members in the near future to give them an opportunity to be part of this legacy project.

The Trust is committed to completing the trail by early fall and looks forward to welcoming the community to the Open House, October 14th, to enjoy some of the best vistas the Rideau area has to offer.

RWLT News Briefs

Job Creation Partnership - The RWLT has been approved by the Ontario Ministry of Universities and Colleges for the creation of 2 trail technician positions for the Sugarbush Island Walking Trail for the summer of 2012.

Partnership Difficulties - Unfortunately some of our land conservation partner groups are experiencing financial difficulties due to government cutbacks. The RWLT has had to adjust its operating methods with this loss of support. Although our programs continue and the RWLT remains strong, we have lost some shared staff in the office. This is one area we have had to adjust, by reducing office hours to enable our staff to attend to responsibilities on our lands.

Healthy Communities Partnership - The RWLT was invited and has accepted an invitation to join with other organizations and individuals to work together to make our communities as healthy as possible. Working under the leadership of the Leeds, Grenville and Lanark Health Unit we are excited to be part of this vibrant group and hope to be able to report on some great projects in the near future..

Rideau Corridor Landscape Strategy - As part of the ongoing development of the Rideau Corridor Landscape Strategy the public is encouraged to participate in the Landscape Character Assessment portion of the project through ways including: via social media, contributing to an online photographic library of the Rideau Corridor's landscapes, and attending the next round of community workshops to be held in the summertime. 
Volunteer Opportunities—With 19 properties the Trust has volunteer opportunities for all. Please consider helping out.
